<p>IQAC is constantly playing a vital role in holistic development of the college. Major significant contributions are as follows: 1. Student Learning Centre - SLC, an initiative of IQAC has been setup to bridge the gap between theory and practical learning in the real world. Under the aegis of IQAC, six add-on courses covering various soft skills among students such as 'introduction to Machine learning for life science and physics students', 'Computer Algebra System (CAS): Maxima', 'future skills to boost employability's and many more were successfully conducted by Student Learning Centre. The courses were in-house as in the Faculty of Hansraj College was involved as resource person. 2. In the pursuit of excellence in higher education and Research, Hansraj College launched a multidisciplinary quarterly bilingual research journal "HansShodhSudha - Vigyaan-Vaanijaya-kala ka Shodh Sangam (Confluence of Science, Commerce and Humanities)" in the month of July 2020. It successfully published four issues during the year. 3. IQAC this year was continuously involved in the promotions of the faculty while maintaining transparency in line with the SOPs issued by the University wherein on the recommendations of the selection committee, the governing body in its meeting approved the promotion of 65 Assistant Prof Stage 1 to Stage 2 , 75 Assistant Prof Stage 2 to Stage 3 and 44 teachers from Assistant Prof Stage 3 to Associate level, under Career Advancement Scheme - 2018/2010. 4. IQAC, Hansraj College successfully partnered with Vidhya Vistar Scheme of University of Delhi (the aim is to partner with higher educational institutes located in remotes areas and support them in various ways). Hansraj College has also initiated its own scheme "Gyan Setu Scheme" based on the principle of mutual collaboration in terms of teaching, research and sharing knowledge between two colleges in the remotest areas of the India. Some of the partner colleges are Government Post-Graduate College Akhand Chandi Palace, Chamba, Himachal Pradesh, Government College Yachuli, Arunachal Pradesh, Government College Drass, Ladakh, Dergaon Kamal Dowerah College,</p>		

Dibrugarh University etc. 5. For effective online teaching-learning, the teaching learning app Microsoft Team was opted for the academic session 2020-21. IQAC arranged a training workshop by Microsoft Teams officials on 28th July 2020 to make teaching staff familiar with the app. An Apex committee for online education was formed to look into the issues with online teaching platform. Additionally, IQAC Hansraj College organized several an online interdisciplinary FDP such as "Intellectual Property Rights", "Basic research tools" and "online teaching tools" etc. in collaboration with Mahatma Hansraj Faculty Development Centre. The emphasis was given on IPR Licensing, IPR Valuation, Incubation centre, best practices for IPR at academic institutes, research and publication etc. IQAC Hansraj College successfully conducted a two-day inter-college training Program for non-teaching staff on " ICT skills for Office Management " and "Stress Management in the month of January. The former program was aimed to help the office staff to be proficient in the use of various available ICT tools. While the latter was aimed at managing a person's level of stress for enhancing everyday functioning.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Hansraj College adheres to a harmonized and well-planned pedagogic approach. Planning for each semester starts in the previous semester itself. The college academic calendar and teacher and student timetables are in place much before the beginning of each semester. The college invites options from students well before the semester begins so that the college departments are well prepared to cater to the student's preferences wherever electives have to be offered. Workload calculation is made and faculty is hired if need be. As an attempt to increase the efficiency of curriculum delivery, the faculty is required to prepare modular teaching plans before the beginning of the semester and share the same with the IQAC. Regular Faculty Development Programmes are organized so teachers can update their knowledge. Teachers are also members of various bodies of the University contributing to curriculum reviews, assessment and

evaluation. Periodic review of curriculum delivery is carried out during department meetings and any mid-course correction done if necessary. The college administration supports the departments in this process in every possible way by providing requisite infrastructure. At the end of each semester, teachers submit internal assessment marks, which are moderated by the Moderation Committee.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

Being a constituent college of Delhi University, we are bound by the procedures prescribed by the University with respect to the academic calendar and internal assessment of students. The internal assessment grades so arrived at are combined with the semester end examination grades to compute the consolidated semester grades. However, it is our constant endeavour to promote among teachers a culture that encourages continuous evaluation in some form or the other. Such interventions are likely to catalyse constant and consistent efforts on the part of students and at the same time enhance the productivity of their efforts by providing ample space for corrective action. A system of continuous internal evaluation serves like an alarm or sounding system that alerts the student where there is scope for corrective action. This continuous evaluation may take the form of class tests, quizzes and participation in class discussions that result in a consolidation of the underlying assets learnt in class. The mentorship program run by the college also compliments this process. Each student is assigned a teacher as a mentor and mentees are encouraged to discuss their progress with them on a weekly basis so that corrective action is taken when necessary.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The assessment of the learning levels of students is a prerequisite and hence an integral part of an effective teaching-learning process. This assessment is a continuous process accomplished by both formal and informal means. Formally, regular assignments and tutorials are used as inputs to assess the learning gaps which are then addressed during lectures and future tutorials. An informal assessment of the learning gaps is done via the mentoring ecosystem established in our college. Mentors have been able to get feedback about the extent of gaps which are then conveyed to the concerned teachers who then take corrective action. Instances have come to light where learning in a particular subject was suffering because of the gaps from a previous foundational paper, identified during a mentorship session. This was conveyed to the concerned teacher who then scheduled some extra classes to bridge the gap.

Since the learning accomplished is not homogenous, it becomes imperative to identify the slow learners and devise strategies differentially for them relative to the advanced learners. To assess the same, separate strategies have been adopted for slow and advanced learners which are stated below in an additional link.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

There can be no doubt that classroom teaching needs to incorporate elements that make it significantly more than the mere teaching of the prescribed texts. The objective of the teaching-learning process is to equip the students with skills that make them good lifelong learners. One of the ways that this might be accomplished is by teaching them problem-solving strategies which will allow them to think creatively and critically. Since problem-solving is not a skill that can be taught in the abstract and independent of context, teachers use discipline and course-specific examples and applications to real-life phenomena to generate such capacities. Participative learning through educational trips and presentation-oriented assessment is implemented wherever feasible. Other discipline-specific approaches take the form of extension lectures that expose students to the frontiers of the subject and give them glimpses of what further studies in the discipline involved. Invited talks by luminaries in the specific academic discipline add depth and many new dimensions to the accumulated learning of the students. Every department has a departmental society that engages in activities that add the fun factor to learning via standalone competitions and departmental fest. Add-on courses are regularly organized for students to empower them with the knowledge that allows them to take forward their learning experience at their own pace. All of the above and more are incorporated at every level, be it the teacher, department, or the college to ensure that the students get a wholesome and enriching educational experience.

Being a constituent college of Delhi University, we are bound by the procedures prescribed by the University with respect to the internal

assessment of students. The internal assessment grades so arrived at are combined with the semester-end examination grades to compute the consolidated semester grades. However, it is our constant endeavor to promote among teachers a culture that encourages continuous evaluation in some form or the other. The consequences of such a strategy are positive and to say the least two-fold. On the one hand, such interventions are likely to catalyze constant and consistent efforts on the part of students and at the same time enhance the productivity of their efforts by providing ample space for corrective action.

Given the working of the semester system, where each teaching day forms a substantial proportion of the total teaching per semester, a slight slip on the part of a student can derail his/her preparations and suck him into a downward spiral with very undeserved consequences. A system of continuous internal evaluation serves like an alarm or sounding system that alerts the student while there is scope for corrective action. This continuous evaluation may take the form of class tests, quizzes, and participation in class discussions that result in a consolidation of the underlying concepts learned in class. The mentorship program run by the college also compliments this process as mentees are encouraged to discuss progress with their mentors who with their experience are in a good position to suggest corrective action while there is time. To the extent possible, the mentorship program is scheduled in accordance with this objective.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Hansraj College is a constituent college of the University of Delhi and hence conforms to the prescribed system of evaluation- i.e. 75% weightage to the final examination and 25% to internal assessment.

Internal assessment is shared with students by the concerned teacher as soon as it has been finalized. Any related discrepancies and grievances are brought to the notice of the teachers and are addressed by them. The system of continuous evaluation ensures that teachers and students are in constant touch with each other which

reduces the probability of any delays in redressal if needed. Multiple opportunities are provided to the students to better their performance. Departments are instructed to contact students who have not appeared for internal assessment for whatsoever reason through the mail and/or other modes including taking assistance from the mentors of the concerned students.

Moderation of the assessment is done at two levels. There is a department moderation committee comprising of the current Teacher in charge, previous Teacher in charge, and senior-most department member. Once moderation has been done at the level of the department, it is placed in the purview of the college Moderation committee consisting of senior college faculty.

Once ample opportunity has been provided to the students to notify any discrepancies, the assessment is sent to the university. If in spite of the rigor of the above mechanism an error is reported by a student or faculty it is conveyed to the university.

The program-specific outcomes provide the general structure for designing the extra and co-curricular activities for the students of a particular discipline while the course outlines are more specific to the courses offered by the discipline. As we are a constituent college of the University of Delhi, the course outcomes are prescribed by the University of Delhi and are uploaded on the university website. However, we display the same on our college website for the ready reference of our students. Additionally, each department holds an orientation at the beginning of the academic year and each semester, where the program and course outcomes are introduced in detail. During the course of the academic session, teachers inform students of any revisions in the course outcomes which they become aware of by virtue of being attendees at the course revision meetings held at their respective departments. Constant efforts are made by the faculty to encourage and initiate

activities that contribute to the achievement of the program and program-specific outcomes. These are manifested in the programs of the departmental societies, alumni connects, extension lectures add-on courses etc.

2.6.2 - Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

The attainment of program and course outcomes are evaluated through both formal and informal means.

The most direct measurement is provided by the examination system. In this area, we are bound by the requirements of the University of Delhi which is to give 75% weightage to the end semester examination conducted by the university and 25% to the internal assessment done by the course instructor.

The system of internal assessment provides us with some flexibility with respect to the exact manner of evaluation with respect to the number and method of assessment employed. IA is continuous so that students get to know if they are lagging in a particular area and then are given an opportunity to make up for it. Hence, frequent assignments using MCQs, long answers, quizzes, etc. are used to measure course outcomes effectively.

Another feature that works towards the effective attainment of outcomes is to collect student satisfaction feedback so that gaps may be addressed to the extent and as soon as possible.

We measure the success of our efforts by keeping track of our graduating students. The placement and internship cells work towards the employment of our students and we assess ourselves by looking at the percentage of students placed in jobs and those pursuing internships. Many of our students benefit from the activities of the entrepreneurial cell and emerge as self-employed individuals with impressive start-ups. We are in the process of setting up an incubation cell that will contribute immensely to the attainment of these outcomes.

Each year numerous students leave college for higher studies both abroad and within the country. For this, they take letters of recommendations from their teachers and this allows us to keep track of the success of our goals in this area.

Among the many societies that we have, there are some that prepare our students for careers in the civil services MBA, other government exams, for corporate, etc., and each year we proudly celebrate the success of many of our students.

Our alumni association ensures that we continue to stay in touch with our students who often return to deliver talks, share their knowledge and life experiences with the currently enrolled students and this is definitely a measure of the attainment of the goals that we strive to achieve each day, year after year.

1. The Hans Raj college has one of the well established, automated, air-conditioned and largest library in terms of space and collection among north campus colleges of University of Delhi. The library located at the center of the campus, using RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology with Integrated Multiuser Library Management Software i.e. KOHA (Fully Automated, version 19.05.06.000, year 2016) have

facility of Wi-Fi connectivity and under surveillance of CCTV Cameras.

2. The college library adopted the RFID technology in year 2016 for the purpose of Library housekeeping operation, efficient security system, well tracking of materials throughout the library, faster circulation of books, inventorying, material handling and automated book drop, self-kiosk being used and in practice.
3. RFID technology consist of KIOSK, staff work station, RFID reader, security gate, Book drop box, RFID tags, RFID enabled member ID card etc. and also alerts users through e-mail and SMS.
4. The college library has more than 1,37,883 books, around 9,137 book bank collection, 23 newspapers and 44 journals and magazines. It also occupied reference materials and Student Aided Fund' collection. The library has excellent collection of text, general and reference books to support academic requirements of students & faculty members.
5. The collection covers broadly science discipline i.e. Botany, Zoology, physics, chemistry, electronics, anthropology, life science etc. It also covers the arts and commerce discipline.
6. Apart from in house collection, the library has full access to the thousands of journals online through DULS and N-LIST database.
7. N-LIST: It is a comprehensive database where users of Hansraj College can access more than 6000+ e-journals, 199500 e-books through National Digital Library. It covers all the disciplines i.e., Pure science, Social Sciences and Humanities Including languages and linguistic.
8. The library is spacious and consists of Ground Floor and First Floor.

The overall college campus is maintained by a consultant engineer, junior engineer and care taker. A team housekeeping staff and gardeners assist in college maintenance. Library staff maintains the library. Books etc. are purchased in consultation with staff members, under the supervision of the library advisory committee. Each laboratory has lab assistants and attendants for the maintenance of laboratory equipment and stock keeping of chemicals and materials on regular basis. The college has 4 coaches in basketball, archery, shooting and yoga apart from 5 non-teaching staff who serve as ground man. The hostel staff manages the functioning of the hostel. A simplified and transparent procedure is followed in the utilizing the available facilities in the college. A sports council comprised of student's representatives is formed that holds regular competitions involving various sports activities to engage all students of the college. Societies like Placement cell and internship cell have helped channelizing the student's carriers and they are the core members of the societies in the college. There are over 60 societies wherein students participate and work under different aspects.

The college continues to grow as an institution in spite of the unprecedented challenges caused by the Covid 19 pandemic. Not only did it pursue the plan to enhance research culture on academic front but also acted as a responsible organization sensitive to extend assistance and succor to its teaching and non-teaching staff members, students as well as the wider social community.

Following two strategic plans were successfully put into practice:

1. To nurture research culture in the college, the Hansraj College successfully launched its own multidisciplinary quarterly bilingual, peer-reviewed, research journal "Hans ShodhSudha" in July 2020. The journal has recently acquired

its ISSN number.

2. To mitigate the hardship caused by the pandemic, Hansraj College undertook a host of initiatives of social welfare. The college ran a free vaccination drive for people above 18 years of age. The annual statutory audit on the accounts of the college comprising of salary, fee collection, scholarship, UGC grant, the income of the Self-Financed Courses is conducted by the chartered accountant .

The funds received through various projects/schemes/programmes are channelized constructively and the utilization certificate is submitted to the funding agency with audited statements of accounts. The scholarship accounts are maintained by the college office. The college makes a transparent financial transaction through cheques or NEFT. The PFMS system is followed in dealing the transactions with the government funding agencies.

The objective of the academic audit is to identify faculty efforts that are required to improve the quality of teaching and learning. The academic audit was executed in the month of December.

The Mentorship program continued to run in the session. Every faculty member continues to mentor and guide a group of 25 students through the session.

Student learning Centre encompass online add-on courses, remedial and bridge classes, language proficiency classes for students.

The feedback team collects feedback forms from the stakeholders on the regular basis. In-depth analysis of the information followed by improvement steps are taken by IQAC team which in turn passed on to the respective department.

SEC paper Applied Gender Studies: Media Literacies and GE paper titled Contemporary India: Women and Empowerment offered by the Department of English examine the intersections of gender with other categories like caste, race, etc., to understand how different forms of privilege/oppression and resistance/subversion interact in heterogeneous and variable formations. Further, the core paper on Women's Writing offered to students pursuing BA (H) in English, enables them to understand the social construction of woman by patriarchy highlight the structural oppression of women, foregrounds resistance by women; discusses women's writing as an act of resistance and of grasping agency. The academic efforts in the direction of gender parity are supplemented by co-curricular activities of the Women Development Cell and the Gender Equality Cell that regularly hold discussions, talks, seminars, film screenings and capacity-building programmes in the college.

A project to educate the farmers about environmental hazards of stubble burning, and alternative mechanisms for disposing it while also deriving financial benefits, has been underway. There are ongoing initiatives for democratizing wealth-creation in the marginalized sections of the society, like the underprivileged children and the disabled, through imparting digital literacy and providing mentorship and avenues for employment. Assistance in de-addiction and mental health workshops for the drug-addicts is provided through partnerships with several NGOs. Since the national progress can't be accelerated enough till the women population is enabled to contribute equally, there are multiple forums and seminars for discussing the issues of women safety, gender biases, equal opportunities, and ways to make tangible societal changes towards harnessing women power.

7.2.1 - Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Best Practice I: Developing Social Entrepreneurship

1. Objectives of the Practice

A team of student volunteers and faculty have been operationalizing a hugely successful program, which involves creating a more sustainable and equitable world through the positive power of social entrepreneurship. A variety of initiatives have been conceptualised and activities undertaken on issues like education, environment, water, and the like while taking care of students' holistic growth. It involves empowering various marginalized communities and focusing on the promotion of women in businesses. An important outcome is an all-around development of volunteering students, who get to interact with major stakeholders and work cohesively in a pragmatic setup.

2. The Context

The intent is to engage the students in solving the socio-economic problems of the marginalized, where they develop insights into the challenges at the grassroots level and develop their thinking, collaboration, and leadership abilities to make a lasting impact on society. Primary focus remains on starting sustainable entrepreneurial ventures. The progress review mechanisms are put in place as an active feedback system for course-corrections and driving the results. The college participates in steering the projects and their progress.

3. The Practice

Hansraj's initiative of promoting a sustainable and inclusive world for all is one of its kind and serves multiple purposes. Apart from its aim of assisting and enabling the underprivileged groups, it

provides a platform for the students to be change-makers in their graduation years. This program extends the education system and skilling through on-the-ground experiential learning. It engages the students in different spheres, including non-profit community development, business, and entrepreneurship.

A brief description of the key projects under the program follows.

Vridhhi aims to curb stubble burning, a practice that causes large-scale air pollution, by exploiting various economic alternatives. It provides an opportunity for students to know more about the agricultural space, work with farmers and women entrepreneurs, as well as interact with government bodies working actively on this issue. Vridhhi has been able to touch the lives of countless farmers, marginalized women, and slum families by aiding financial and social progress.

Ahsaas works to help the differently-abled community, deprived of job opportunities, while also catering to the massive need for digital education of underprivileged students. The students realise the grave problems of the not much talked about issue and come up with solutions, including development and enhancement of the computer curriculums to align with the needs of the available work opportunities. Ahsaas has helped a number of differently-abled individuals to prepare for, and then get employment.

Project Armaan is a relatively newer venture, which attempts to break the stigma of drug abuse, and attempts to financially and socially uplift the community and further the cause of de-addiction and rehabilitation. Here too, the students spread awareness on the issue, and engage in entrepreneurial action while working with international agencies, ensuring growth. Armaan has been able to assist many recovering addicts in moving toward a meaningful and independent life.

Therefore, the program provides opportunities to students to experience the real problems of the needy communities, and serve them, while enhancing the students' perspective, problem-solving and organizational capabilities.

4. Outcomes

These programs strive to contribute to nation building by enabling the marginalized communities to work for their and country's development. Each one of these programs has been able to positively touch the lives and livelihoods of scores of families. At the same

time, participation in these programs has benefitted the volunteering students as much as the multitudes that they have served. It teaches them the importance of conducting deep research in the respective problem statement, applying critical analysis of alternatives strategies to solve the problem, experimenting with the solutions in the real world, and continuously refining the approach to achieve success. In the process, they also experience the role of objective decision making, collaboration, competition, leadership, operational aspects and logistical and financial considerations. The best way to describe this experience is entrepreneurship!

5. Evidence of Success

All three initiatives of Enactus Hansraj have been able to generate considerable social, economic and environmental impact in their respective domains. A team of 18 students working on Project Vriddhi have helped 200+ farmers, 50+ marginalized women and 100+ slum families. Farmers were able to enhance their income by about 30% and the marginalized women under Shilpkari have been able to earn ₹12,500 per month with a few hours of additional work. Project Ahsaas, managed by a team of 16 students, has been able to uplift 120+ differently-abled individuals providing them social and work inclusion in the society as well as increasing their incomes through the sale of their products. Ahsaas has been able to generate around ₹24000 through marketing products on various forums. A team of 16 students managing Project Armaan has by provided financial aid for self-dependence to 60+ recovering or recovered drug addicts.

The students of Hansraj College participated in the Enactus National Symposium in July 2020, and emerged as the National Champions, amongst 80+ participating teams. The team then represented India at the Enactus World Cup organized by KPMG and Unilever. Team India was one of the Top 4 Teams at the World Cup.

The efforts of our students have been recognized through mentions in over 17 national and regional newspapers like the Indian Express and media mentions, with a combined reach of 15.9 million impressions.

Establishing and upholding such ventures has seeded entrepreneurial leadership and social innovation into the volunteering students, who can successfully apply these learnings to their domains in practical life. While working on these ventures, students have been able to grasp many technical and soft skills which have helped them to ideate, create and analyse opportunities in their respective fields. The experience of participating in all the international level events, not only enhances the students' competence, but also helps

them recognize the value of achieving a mutual goal, of making the world a better place to live in.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The outreach programs often have monetary requirements. At times, some permissions are needed from concerned government authorities, as was for penetration in far-off communities and stimulation of change in the fields of education and environment. College administration has always supported the students in the process and addressed any temporary hindrances.

The most valuable resource is the commitment from student members in terms of time and effort. No matter what difficulties arise, the college team has always come together to tide over any challenges.

Best Practice II: Mentorship

1.Objectives

Hansraj College has a uniquely successful Mentorship program, which it instituted in 2016. It is aimed at supporting the incoming adolescents in acclimatizing with the college, fellow students, coursework, and helping them navigate any other issues they may be facing. This program is particularly useful for the outstation students, who often experience significant changes in their environment and expectations from them.

2.Context

Today, more than two thirds of Hansraj's students are from outside Delhi. Often living in hostels and paying guest accommodation away from the known comforts of their homes, they are suddenly ushered into an unfamiliar territory on many fronts. Besides dealing with a tough academic regime in an unknown city, they are all-responsible for the daily chores of washing, cleaning, food, transportation, and so on. These students need active help, especially in their early days of settling down, to tide over the challenges of their new existence.

Besides, several students struggle with the coursework, and can benefit by additional guidance.

Our mentorship program fulfils that.

3.Practice

The college begins its academic year with mentorship days. On the assigned day, every new student is allocated a teacher mentor, which remains steady for that year. Each teacher has approximately twenty mentees. On the mentorship days, the students meet their mentors, and the nuances of the mentorship program are explained. While there is a designated slot for mentorship during the week, mentors are available to the mentees virtually all the time. Under mentorship, we commit to a larger stake in the holistic growth and well-being of the students, counselling them about their academic, emotional, and other needs. As the primary stakeholder, the student is encouraged to share any learning problems being faced in the classes or the tutorial systems. Mentors often act as the sounding board to the students, whereby while sharing their challenges, students are guided to come up with solutions too. These personal interactions and student-feedback also provides valuable inputs while assessing the interest in and utility of the Elective courses.

Starting this year, the teachers have extended the mentorship program beyond the college curriculum to also cover the academic challenges that students face while preparing for entrance examinations. Another progression has been to enroll academically strong and communicative senior students to expand the bandwidth for mentorship and coaching junior students.

4. Outcomes

Mentorship has had a strong role in assisting the acclimatization and development of the student community towards successful careers paths. Resolving conflicts and hindrances through mentors always leads to channelization of student energy into positive avenues of learning and development. One way that the established mentorship program tremendously helped in this pandemic year was by assisting the remote students navigate through the unprecedented learning challenges and maintaining contact with the students and teachers. Also, thanks partly to the Mentorship program, Hansraj College had a good line-up of internships and placements this year, despite all the woes of the pandemic.

5. Evidence of success

Cases of bullying and harassment are often first brought to the attention to the mentor. These are not confined to reports within the college but also outside. There have been cases of students calling up their mentors at quite late hours to share their issues. At times, those stresses may even be due to communication gaps with their parents. On several occasions, mentors have engaged in

counselling both the students and their parents to alleviate the problems ailing the student. In the COVID pandemic years, the established mentorship program helped immensely in guiding the mentees through the various challenges of remote learning.

This program has played a vital role in making HRC students among the best adjusted in the University.

6. Problems encountered and resources required

This program hinges on the commitment of teachers to go out of their way to allay the teething problems for the incoming students. Their endeavour is to help the students gain confidence in navigating through their new environment. This is a time-intensive activity and that often acts as a constraint in scaling up the program. To address this challenge, the college is expanding the initiative by inducting senior students who are capable of providing academic mentorship to their juniors.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Hansraj College adheres to a harmonized and well-planned pedagogic approach. Planning for each semester starts in the previous semester itself. The college academic calendar and teacher and student timetables are in place much before the beginning of each semester. The college invites options from students well before the semester begins so that the college departments are well prepared to cater to the student's preferences wherever electives have to be offered. Workload calculation is made and faculty is hired if need be. As an attempt to increase the efficiency of curriculum delivery, the faculty is required to prepare modular teaching plans before the beginning of the semester and share the same with the IQAC. Regular Faculty Development Programmes are organized so teachers can update their knowledge. Teachers are also members of various bodies of the University contributing to curriculum reviews, assessment and evaluation. Periodic review of curriculum delivery is carried out during department meetings and any mid-course correction done if necessary. The college administration supports the departments in this process in every possible way by providing requisite infrastructure. At the end of each semester, teachers submit internal assessment marks, which are moderated by the Moderation Committee.

Being a constituent college of Delhi University, we are bound by the procedures prescribed by the University with respect to the academic calendar and internal assessment of students. The internal assessment grades so arrived at are combined with the

semester end examination grades to compute the consolidated semester grades. However, it is our constant endeavour to promote among teachers a culture that encourages continuous evaluation in some form or the other. Such interventions are likely to catalyse constant and consistent efforts on the part of students and at the same time enhance the productivity of their efforts by providing ample space for corrective action. A system of continuous internal evaluation serves like an alarm or sounding system that alerts the student where there is scope for corrective action. This continuous evaluation may take the form of class tests, quizzes and participation in class discussions that result in a consolidation of the underlying assets learnt in class. The mentorship program run by the college also compliments this process. Each student is assigned a teacher as a mentor and mentees are encouraged to discuss their progress with them on a weekly basis so that corrective action is taken when necessary.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The assessment of the learning levels of students is a prerequisite and hence an integral part of an effective teaching-

learning process. This assessment is a continuous process accomplished by both formal and informal means. Formally, regular assignments and tutorials are used as inputs to assess the learning gaps which are then addressed during lectures and future tutorials. An informal assessment of the learning gaps is done via the mentoring ecosystem established in our college. Mentors have been able to get feedback about the extent of gaps which are then conveyed to the concerned teachers who then take corrective action. Instances have come to light where learning in a particular subject was suffering because of the gaps from a previous foundational paper, identified during a mentorship session. This was conveyed to the concerned teacher who then scheduled some extra classes to bridge the gap.

Since the learning accomplished is not homogenous, it becomes imperative to identify the slow learners and devise strategies differentially for them relative to the advanced learners. To assess the same, separate strategies have been adopted for slow and advanced learners which are stated below in an additional link.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

There can be no doubt that classroom teaching needs to incorporate elements that make it significantly more than the mere teaching of the prescribed texts. The objective of the teaching-learning process is to equip the students with skills that make them good lifelong learners. One of the ways that this might be accomplished is by teaching them problem-solving strategies which will allow them to think creatively and critically. Since problem-solving is not a skill that can be taught in the abstract and independent of context, teachers use discipline and course-specific examples and applications to real-life phenomena to generate such capacities. Participative learning through educational trips and presentation-oriented assessment is implemented wherever feasible. Other discipline-specific approaches take the form of extension lectures that expose students to the frontiers of the subject and give them glimpses of what further studies in the discipline involved. Invited talks by luminaries in the specific academic discipline add depth and many new dimensions to the accumulated learning of the students. Every department has a departmental society that engages in activities that add the fun factor to learning via standalone competitions and departmental fest. Add-on courses are regularly organized for students to empower them with the knowledge that allows them to take forward their learning experience at their own pace. All of the above and more are incorporated at every level, be it the teacher, department, or the college to ensure that the students get a wholesome and enriching educational experience.

The consequences of such a strategy are positive and to say the least two-fold. On the one hand, such interventions are likely to catalyze constant and consistent efforts on the part of students

and at the same time enhance the productivity of their efforts by providing ample space for corrective action.

Given the working of the semester system, where each teaching day forms a substantial proportion of the total teaching per semester, a slight slip on the part of a student can derail his/her preparations and suck him into a downward spiral with very undeserved consequences. A system of continuous internal evaluation serves like an alarm or sounding system that alerts the student while there is scope for corrective action. This continuous evaluation may take the form of class tests, quizzes, and participation in class discussions that result in a consolidation of the underlying concepts learned in class. The mentorship program run by the college also compliments this process as mentees are encouraged to discuss progress with their mentors who with their experience are in a good position to suggest corrective action while there is time. To the extent possible, the mentorship program is scheduled in accordance with this objective.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Hansraj College is a constituent college of the University of Delhi and hence conforms to the prescribed system of evaluation- i.e. 75% weightage to the final examination and 25% to internal assessment.

Internal assessment is shared with students by the concerned teacher as soon as it has been finalized. Any related discrepancies and grievances are brought to the notice of the teachers and are addressed by them. The system of continuous evaluation ensures that teachers and students are in constant touch with each other which reduces the probability of any delays in redressal if needed. Multiple opportunities are provided to the students to better their performance. Departments are instructed to contact students who have not appeared for internal assessment for whatsoever reason through the mail and/or other modes including taking assistance from the mentors of the

concerned students.

Moderation of the assessment is done at two levels. There is a department moderation committee comprising of the current Teacher in charge, previous Teacher in charge, and senior-most department member. Once moderation has been done at the level of the department, it is placed in the purview of the college Moderation committee consisting of senior college faculty.

Once ample opportunity has been provided to the students to notify any discrepancies, the assessment is sent to the university. If in spite of the rigor of the above mechanism an error is reported by a student or faculty it is conveyed to the university.

2.6.1 - Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

The program-specific outcomes provide the general structure for designing the extra and co-curricular activities for the students of a particular discipline while the course outlines are more specific to the courses offered by the discipline. As we are a constituent college of the University of Delhi, the course outcomes are prescribed by the University of Delhi and are uploaded on the university website. However, we display the same on our college website for the ready reference of our students. Additionally, each department holds an orientation at the beginning of the academic year and each semester, where the program and course outcomes are introduced in detail. During the course of the academic session, teachers inform students of any revisions in the course outcomes which they become aware of by virtue of being attendees at the course revision meetings held at their respective departments. Constant efforts are made by the faculty to encourage and initiate activities that contribute to the achievement of the program and program-specific outcomes. These are manifested in the programs of the departmental societies, alumni connects, extension lectures add-on courses

2.6.2 - Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

The attainment of program and course outcomes are evaluated through both formal and informal means.

The most direct measurement is provided by the examination system. In this area, we are bound by the requirements of the University of Delhi which is to give 75% weightage to the end semester examination conducted by the university and 25% to the internal assessment done by the course instructor.

The system of internal assessment provides us with some flexibility with respect to the exact manner of evaluation with respect to the number and method of assessment employed. IA is continuous so that students get to know if they are lagging in a particular area and then are given an opportunity to make up for it. Hence, frequent assignments using MCQs, long answers, quizzes, etc. are used to measure course outcomes effectively.

Another feature that works towards the effective attainment of outcomes is to collect student satisfaction feedback so that gaps may be addressed to the extent and as soon as possible.

We measure the success of our efforts by keeping track of our graduating students. The placement and internship cells work towards the employment of our students and we assess ourselves by looking at the percentage of students placed in jobs and those pursuing internships. Many of our students benefit from the activities of the entrepreneurial cell and emerge as self-employed individuals with impressive start-ups. We are in the process of setting up an incubation cell that will contribute immensely to the attainment of these outcomes.

Each year numerous students leave college for higher studies both abroad and within the country. For this, they take letters of

recommendations from their teachers and this allows us to keep track of the success of our goals in this area.

Among the many societies that we have, there are some that prepare our students for careers in the civil services MBA, other government exams, for corporate, etc., and each year we proudly celebrate the success of many of our students.

Our alumni association ensures that we continue to stay in touch with our students who often return to deliver talks, share their knowledge and life experiences with the currently enrolled students and this is definitely a measure of the attainment of the goals that we strive to achieve each day, year after year.

1. The Hans Raj college has one of the well established, automated, air-conditioned and largest library in terms of space and collection among north campus colleges of University of Delhi. The library located at the center of the campus, using RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology with Integrated Multiuser Library Management Software i.e. KOHA (Fully Automated, version 19.05.06.000, year 2016) have facility of Wi-Fi connectivity and under surveillance of CCTV Cameras.
2. The college library adopted the RFID technology in year 2016 for the purpose of Library housekeeping operation, efficient security system, well tracking of materials throughout the library, faster circulation of books, inventorying, material handling and automated book drop, self-kiosk being used and in practice.
3. RFID technology consist of KIOSK, staff work station, RFID reader, security gate, Book drop box, RFID tags, RFID enabled member ID card etc. and also alerts users through e-mail and SMS.
4. The college library has more than 1,37,883 books, around 9,137 book bank collection, 23 newspapers and 44 journals and magazines. It also occupied reference materials and Student Aided Fund' collection. The library has excellent collection of text, general and reference books to support academic requirements of students & faculty members.
5. The collection covers broadly science discipline i.e. Botany, Zoology, physics, chemistry, electronics, anthropology, life science etc. It also covers the arts and commerce discipline.
6. Apart from in house collection, the library has full access to the thousands of journals online through DULS and N-LIST database.
7. N-LIST: It is a comprehensive database where users of Hansraj College can access more than 6000+ e-journals, 199500 e-books through National Digital Library. It covers all the disciplines i.e., Pure science, Social Sciences and Humanities Including languages and linguistic.
8. The library is spacious and consists of Ground Floor and First Floor.

taker. A team housekeeping staff and gardeners assist in college maintenance. Library staff maintains the library. Books etc. are purchased in consultation with staff members, under the supervision of the library advisory committee. Each laboratory has lab assistants and attendants for the maintenance of laboratory equipment and stock keeping of chemicals and materials on regular basis. The college has 4 coaches in basketball, archery, shooting and yoga apart from 5 non-teaching staff who serve as ground man. The hostel staff manages the functioning of the hostel. A simplified and transparent procedure is followed in the utilizing the available facilities in the college. The college continues to grow as an institution in spite of the unprecedented challenges caused by the Covid 19 pandemic. Not only did it pursue the plan to enhance research culture on academic front but also acted as a responsible organization sensitive to extend assistance and succor to its teaching and non-teaching staff members, students as well as the wider social community.

Following two strategic plans were successfully put into practice:

1. To nurture research culture in the college, the Hansraj College successfully launched its own multidisciplinary quarterly bilingual, peer-reviewed, research journal "Hans ShodhSudha" in July 2020. The journal has recently acquired its ISSN number.
2. To mitigate the hardship caused by the pandemic, Hansraj College undertook a host of initiatives of social welfare. The college ran a free vaccination drive for people above 18 years of age. The fitness centre of the college was converted into a vaccination centre. Vaccination coverage offered within the college premises ensured that both the first and the second dose were made available at the same center alongside the facility of medical examination of the recipient of the vaccine. The DAV governing body which consists of a Chairperson and members of the governing body in conjunction with the University of Delhi, formulate the academic, administrative and financial policies that are disseminated within the larger community of the college under of supervision of the college principal. To regularly assess the potentialities and to improve the performance, teaching staff have to submit the Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR) on the annual basis. The Internal Audit of the college by DAV makes a thorough audit of the expenditures of the college. The external audit is conducted by CAG every 5 years. The objections raised are settled by the accounts office in consultation with the Finance committee of the college.

The annual statutory audit on the accounts of the college

comprising of salary, fee collection, scholarship, UGC grant, the income of the Self-Financed Courses is conducted by the chartered accountant .

The funds received through various projects/schemes/programmes are channelized constructively and the utilization certificate is submitted to the funding agency with audited statements of accounts. The scholarship accounts are maintained by the college office. The college makes a transparent financial transaction through cheques or NEFT. The PFMS system is followed in dealing the transactions with the government funding agencies.

However, during the FY 2020-21, due to unprecedented circumstances which have arisen due to COVID-19, the audit has got delayed and is currently under process.

IQAC has constituted sub-committees such as Academic Audit committee, Mentorship Cell, Student Learning Centre, Feedback analysis team which complements and results in incremental improvement in overall teaching learning process.

The objective of the academic audit is to identify faculty efforts that are required to improve the quality of teaching and learning. The academic audit was executed in the month of December.

The Mentorship program continued to run in the session. Every faculty member continues to mentor and guide a group of 25 students through the session.

Student learning Centre encompass online add-on courses, remedial and bridge classes, language proficiency classes for students.

The feedback team collects feedback forms from the stakeholders on the regular basis. In-depth analysis of the information followed by improvement steps are taken by IQAC team which in turn passed on to the respective department.

The curricular initiatives undertaken for the purpose include the decision to offer such GE and SEC papers that mainstream ideas of gender studies and equip students from science and commerce streams, in addition to those of humanities courses, to become informed consumers as well as ethical participants in popular cultural discourses. SEC paper Applied Gender Studies: Media Literacies and GE paper titled Contemporary India: Women and Empowerment offered by the Department of English examine the intersections of gender with other categories like caste, race, etc., to understand how different forms of privilege/oppression and resistance/subversion interact in heterogeneous and variable formations. Further, the core paper on Women's Writing offered to students pursuing BA (H) in English, enables them to understand the social construction of woman by patriarchy highlight the structural oppression of women, foregrounds resistance by women; discusses women's writing as an act of resistance and of grasping agency. The academic efforts in the direction of gender parity are supplemented by co-curricular activities of the Women Development Cell and the Gender Equality Cell that regularly hold discussions, talks, seminars, film screenings and capacity-building programmes in the college.

Waste constitutes food left-overs, old books, paper, cardboard, plastics, cans, glass, clothes, housewares, electronics, chemicals, maintenance and construction debris, garden leaves, biologically hazardous materials, etc. Focus on the environment and cleanliness, we take several measures for waste management.

- 4. A fully automated compost machine will be owned by the**

college for conversion of food and gardenwaste to fertilizer. For this a bid of fully automated compost with capacity of 100 kg/day has been published and it is the final stage of procurement.

6. Encourage recovery and recycling of paper, books etc. amongst students and staff.

Hansraj College invests substantially to inculcate a sense of nation building amongst its students. It actively engages them through activities like webinar about casting votes for a thriving democracy and events for brainstorming ideas on how India can make more rapid strides towards self-reliance, equitable-prosperity and becoming a global powerhouse. The emphasis is on how everyone can and must contribute to national progress. Maladies such as corruption and women oppression are aptly sensitized through the media of dramatics and debates. A project to educate the farmers about environmental hazards of stubble burning, and alternative mechanisms for disposing it while also deriving financial benefits, has been underway. There are ongoing initiatives for democratizing wealth-creation in the marginalized sections of the society, like the underprivileged children and the disabled, through imparting digital literacy and providing mentorship and avenues for employment. Assistance in de-addiction and mental health workshops for the drug-addicts is provided through partnerships with several NGOs. Since the national progress can't be accelerated enough till the women population is enabled to contribute equally, there are multiple forums and seminars for discussing the issues of women safety, gender biases, equal opportunities, and ways to make tangible societal changes towards harnessing women power.

7.2 - Best Practices

7.2.1 - Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Best Practice I: Developing Social Entrepreneurship

1. Objectives of the Practice

A team of student volunteers and faculty have been operationalizing a hugely successful program, which involves creating a more sustainable and equitable world through the positive power of social entrepreneurship. A variety of initiatives have been conceptualised and activities undertaken on issues like education, environment, water, and the like while taking care of students' holistic growth. It involves empowering various marginalized communities and focusing on the promotion of women in businesses. An important outcome is an all-around development of volunteering students, who get to interact with major stakeholders and work cohesively in a pragmatic setup.

2. The Context

The intent is to engage the students in solving the socio-economic problems of the marginalized, where they develop insights into the challenges at the grassroots level and develop their thinking, collaboration, and leadership abilities to make a lasting impact on society. Primary focus remains on starting sustainable entrepreneurial ventures. The progress review mechanisms are put in place as an active feedback system for course-corrections and driving the results. The college participates in steering the projects and their progress.

3. The Practice

Hansraj's initiative of promoting a sustainable and inclusive

world for all is one of its kind and serves multiple purposes. Apart from its aim of assisting and enabling the underprivileged groups, it provides a platform for the students to be change-makers in their graduation years. This program extends the education system and skilling through on-the-ground experiential learning. It engages the students in different spheres, including non-profit community development, business, and entrepreneurship.

A brief description of the key projects under the program follows.

Vridhhi aims to curb stubble burning, a practice that causes large-scale air pollution, by exploiting various economic alternatives. It provides an opportunity for students to know more about the agricultural space, work with farmers and women entrepreneurs, as well as interact with government bodies working actively on this issue. Vridhhi has been able to touch the lives of countless farmers, marginalized women, and slum families by aiding financial and social progress.

Ahsaas works to help the differently-abled community, deprived of job opportunities, while also catering to the massive need for digital education of underprivileged students. The students realise the grave problems of the not much talked about issue and come up with solutions, including development and enhancement of the computer curriculums to align with the needs of the available work opportunities. Ahsaas has helped a number of differently-abled individuals to prepare for, and then get employment.

Project Armaan is a relatively newer venture, which attempts to break the stigma of drug abuse, and attempts to financially and socially uplift the community and further the cause of de-addiction and rehabilitation. Here too, the students spread awareness on the issue, and engage in entrepreneurial action while working with international agencies, ensuring growth. Armaan has been able to assist many recovering addicts in moving toward a meaningful and independent life.

Therefore, the program provides opportunities to students to experience the real problems of the needy communities, and serve them, while enhancing the students' perspective, problem-solving and organizational capabilities.

4. Outcomes

These programs strive to contribute to nation building by

enabling the marginalized communities to work for their and country's development. Each one of these programs has been able to positively touch the lives and livelihoods of scores of families. At the same time, participation in these programs has benefitted the volunteering students as much as the multitudes that they have served. It teaches them the importance of conducting deep research in the respective problem statement, applying critical analysis of alternatives strategies to solve the problem, experimenting with the solutions in the real world, and continuously refining the approach to achieve success. In the process, they also experience the role of objective decision making, collaboration, competition, leadership, operational aspects and logistical and financial considerations. The best way to describe this experience is entrepreneurship!

5. Evidence of Success

All three initiatives of Enactus Hansraj have been able to generate considerable social, economic and environmental impact in their respective domains. A team of 18 students working on Project Vriddhi have helped 200+ farmers, 50+ marginalized women and 100+ slum families. Farmers were able to enhance their income by about 30% and the marginalized women under Shilpkari have been able to earn ₹ 12,500 per month with a few hours of additional work. Project Ahsaas, managed by a team of 16 students, has been able to uplift 120+ differently-abled individuals providing them social and work inclusion in the society as well as increasing their incomes through the sale of their products. Ahsaas has been able to generate around ₹24000 through marketing products on various forums. A team of 16 students managing Project Armaan has by provided financial aid for self-dependence to 60+ recovering or recovered drug addicts.

The students of Hansraj College participated in the Enactus National Symposium in July 2020, and emerged as the National Champions, amongst 80+ participating teams. The team then represented India at the Enactus World Cup organized by KPMG and Unilever. Team India was one of the Top 4 Teams at the World Cup.

The efforts of our students have been recognized through mentions in over 17 national and regional newspapers like the Indian Express and media mentions, with a combined reach of 15.9 million impressions.

Establishing and upholding such ventures has seeded entrepreneurial leadership and social innovation into the

volunteering students, who can successfully apply these learnings to their domains in practical life. While working on these ventures, students have been able to grasp many technical and soft skills which have helped them to ideate, create and analyse opportunities in their respective fields. The experience of participating in all the international level events, not only enhances the students' competence, but also helps them recognize the value of achieving a mutual goal, of making the world a better place to live in.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The outreach programs often have monetary requirements. At times, some permissions are needed from concerned government authorities, as was for penetration in far-off communities and stimulation of change in the fields of education and environment. College administration has always supported the students in the process and addressed any temporary hindrances.

The most valuable resource is the commitment from student members in terms of time and effort. No matter what difficulties arise, the college team has always come together to tide over any challenges.

Best Practice II: Mentorship

1.Objectives

Hansraj College has a uniquely successful Mentorship program, which it instituted in 2016. It is aimed at supporting the incoming adolescents in acclimatizing with the college, fellow students, coursework, and helping them navigate any other issues they may be facing. This program is particularly useful for the outstation students, who often experience significant changes in their environment and expectations from them.

2.Context

Today, more than two thirds of Hansraj's students are from outside Delhi. Often living in hostels and paying guest accommodation away from the known comforts of their homes, they are suddenly ushered into an unfamiliar territory on many fronts. Besides dealing with a tough academic regime in an unknown city, they are all-responsible for the daily chores of washing, cleaning, food, transportation, and so on. These students need active help, especially in their early days of settling down, to

tide over the challenges of their new existence.

Besides, several students struggle with the coursework, and can benefit by additional guidance.

Our mentorship program fulfils that.

3. Practice

The college begins its academic year with mentorship days. On the assigned day, every new student is allocated a teacher mentor, which remains steady for that year. Each teacher has approximately twenty mentees. On the mentorship days, the students meet their mentors, and the nuances of the mentorship program are explained. While there is a designated slot for mentorship during the week, mentors are available to the mentees virtually all the time. Under mentorship, we commit to a larger stake in the holistic growth and well-being of the students, counselling them about their academic, emotional, and other needs. As the primary stakeholder, the student is encouraged to share any learning problems being faced in the classes or the tutorial systems. Mentors often act as the sounding board to the students, whereby while sharing their challenges, students are guided to come up with solutions too. These personal interactions and student-feedback also provides valuable inputs while assessing the interest in and utility of the Elective courses.

Starting this year, the teachers have extended the mentorship program beyond the college curriculum to also cover the academic challenges that students face while preparing for entrance examinations. Another progression has been to enroll academically strong and communicative senior students to expand the bandwidth for mentorship and coaching junior students.

4. Outcomes

Mentorship has had a strong role in assisting the acclimatization and development of the student community towards successful careers paths. Resolving conflicts and hindrances through mentors always leads to channelization of student energy into positive avenues of learning and development. One way that the established mentorship program tremendously helped in this pandemic year was by assisting the remote students navigate through the unprecedented learning challenges and maintaining contact with the students and teachers. Also, thanks partly to the Mentorship program, Hansraj College had a good line-up of internships and

placements this year, despite all the woes of the pandemic.

5. Evidence of success

Cases of bullying and harassment are often first brought to the attention to the mentor. These are not confined to reports within the college but also outside. There have been cases of students calling up their mentors at quite late hours to share their issues. At times, those stresses may even be due to communication gaps with their parents. On several occasions, mentors have engaged in counselling both the students and their parents to alleviate the problems ailing the student. In the COVID pandemic years, the established mentorship program helped immensely in guiding the mentees through the various challenges of remote learning.

This program has played a vital role in making HRC students among the best adjusted in the University.

6. Problems encountered and resources required

This program hinges on the commitment of teachers to go out of their way to allay the teething problems for the incoming students. Their endeavour is to help the students gain confidence in navigating through their new environment. This is a time-intensive activity and that often acts as a constraint in scaling up the program. To address this challenge, the college is expanding the initiative by inducting senior students who are capable of providing academic mentorship to their juniors.

1. To focus more on inter-disciplinary research and innovation among faculty and students, the college plans to initiate its own grant to the research proposal submitted by faculty members individually or in collaboration with other faculties from different departments. 2. To incorporate the entrepreneurship skills and to align with new education policy goals to promote innovation ecosystem, the college is planning to organise an add-on certificate course on "innovation, IPRs, start-ups and entrepreneurship". The college is also planning to organise more events such as webinars, training programmes and workshops to aware staff and students about IPRs, incubation centre and start-ups. 3. To understand the policy from different perspectives and to ensure a smooth implementation of NEP 2020 in future, the college is planning to organise one week program with inputs from industry with regards to use of ICT on New Education Policy. 4. To encourage and motivate students for research and development, the college has launched its research journal "HansShodhSudha"

where manuscripts written by students under the guidance of Mentor will be published after peer-review. College has planned to get its ISSN number and to get it enlisted in UGC care. 5. The college is planning to promote the activities involving national and international experts, this will provide an opportunity to researchers and academicians to exchange their views and opinions, address and debate research relevant issues and generate academic research output. 6. The need of Girls hostel is strongly felt and therefore the building committee will be advised to work on that front and come up with a plan to fulfil this. 7. In-house internship for Students will be planned to give them opportunities and exposure that increases their interest and helps them identify their capabilities. 8. The faculty will be encouraged to develop MOOCs and e-content. The college plans to develop an audio video room dedicated for the same.
